Overview

The Class 8 English curriculum aims to enhance students' language proficiency, comprehension, and appreciation of literature. Poetry:

- The Last Bargain: Presents a humorous and thought-provoking perspective on death.
- The School Boy: Captures the joys and challenges of childhood.
- On the Grasshopper and Cricket: Compares and contrasts two different characters through poetic form.

Textbook 2: It So Happened

- Princess September: A magical tale that encourages imagination and creativity.
- The Fight: Explores the complexities of friendship and conflict resolution.
- Jalebis: Introduces students to cultural traditions and food.
- Ancient Education System of India: Provides insights into India's historical educational practices.

Pedagogical Approach

The curriculum will employ a variety of teaching methodologies, including:

- Read-aloud sessions: To model fluent reading and enhance comprehension.
- **Group discussions:** To foster critical thinking and collaborative learning.
